Road in the Town of Milton as being of heritage significance;

THAT Milton Council designate the property under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. O.18 for the reasons outlined in the Reasons for Designation attached as Appendix 1 to this Report;

AND THAT the Town Clerk provides the Notice of Intention to Designate as outlined in Section 29 (4) of the Ontario Heritage Act;

AND FURTHER THAT once the thirty-day objection period has expired and if there are no objections, a designation by-law will be

brought forward for Council adoption.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Dennis Hunter House is a two-and-a-half-storey, smooth red brick house that is a
 good example of late Victorian architecture transitioning into an Edwardian architectural
 style. The bricks used for this house are from the local brickworks. It also has historical
 value because of its connection to Frank McNiven.
- The property's current owner has voluntarily responded to the heritage designation program and desires that their property be designated.
- Staff has evaluated this historic home as a significant built heritage resource for the Town of Milton and should be designated under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act. (See Appendix '1')



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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

 This significant heritage resource fulfils more than two of the evaluation criteria set out in Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act (R.S.O. 1990), Ontario Regulation 9/06 (See Appendix 2). As such, it is worthy of designation under the provisions of the Ontario Heritage Act.

REPORT

Background

The Dennis Hunter House is a two-and-a-half-storey, smooth red brick house that is a good example of late Victorian architecture transitioning into an Edwardian architectural style. The bricks used for this house are from the local brickworks. Its cultural heritage value lies in its historical and architectural significance. Frank McNiven, who served as Councillor and Reeve, governor of the Halton County Jail, the area's Police Chief, and Town of Milton assessor, owned this house from 1920 to 1946.

Discussion

Historically, the house was built in 1900 by Dennis Hunter. He was the son of the pioneer James Hunter, who came to Canada from County Antrim, Northern Ireland. In 1837, he bought this 100-acre farm at Lot 1, Con 2 in the former Township of Nassagaweya. Dennis acquired the property from his father, James, in 1886 and passed it on to his son, Daniel. Daniel sold the property to Frank McNiven in 1920.

The house was constructed in 1900, shortly after the closure of the short-lived Terra Cotta Brick Company in Campbellville. As such, the red terra cotta bricks would have come from the other local brickworks in Milton Heights. These high-quality bricks are found on many buildings that were built in Milton during the late nineteenth/early twentieth century, and this building is a good representative example of their use.

This property is of historic value because of its direct association with Frank McNiven, who owned the property from 1920 to 1946. The McNiven's were a prominent family from the Kilbride area. McNiven Road is named in their honour. Frank served on numerous local boards and councils. He served on the Nassagaweya Township Council and was Reeve in 1928. While owning the property, Frank and his wife, Ruby, moved to Milton in 1936 and were appointed Governor and Matron of the Halton County Jail. Frank also served as Police Chief of Milton, Assessor for the Town, and the Chair of the Town's first Planning Board. More information on Frank can be found in the Milton Historical Society's "Milton Area Biographies".



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Discussion

Physically, the farmhouse is a two-and-a-half-storey smooth red brick house with a field stone foundation that is covered by a cement render. The house has a box-like form, wide projecting eaves. The inclusion of two expansive ground-floor windows reflects the influence of the burgeoning Edwardian Classicism style that became popular in the early twentieth century. The asymmetrical form, front gable dormer and decorative detailing reflect the Romanesque Revival period, being a popular style in Ontario during the latter half of the Victorian era from 1880 to 1900.

Its principal facade includes a hipped roof projecting wing that faces southeast towards Conservation Road (formerly known as Steeles Avenue). This wing has a central gable dormer window with an arched "Romanesque" window and returned eaves. A wide ground-floor window breaks the symmetry of the projecting wing. Originally, the house included decorative gingerbread detailing around the gable window and wooden brackets below the eaves. The front entrance is recessed and includes a modern wood porch. The northeast facade facing Twiss Road is bisected by a tall exterior chimney that once was likely to have included a corbelled chimney cap. Symmetrical windows are placed at the second-floor level; however, at the ground floor level, a wide window exists on one side of the chimney with a small arched "Romanesque" window on the other. Four asymmetrical windows exist on the north-west facing facade with one cellar window below. The rear (or southwest-facing) facade includes one narrow window and a modern vinyl-sided single-storey addition. A second tall interior chimney with a corbelled chimney cap protrudes through the rear hipped roof slope.

All the windows include voussoirs, and all but the window in the front gable dormer include rusticated limestone sills. The inclusion of an arched window on the ground floor level is an unusual feature in Milton, likely reflecting the influence of the Romanesque Revival. A brick water table runs around the exterior of the property. The original single-leaf four-panel wooden entrance door with plain transom remains. It retains its original "wavy" glass, decorative wood trim detailing around the glass panel and its original highly decorative hinges.

Internally, the house retains much of its original details, including its original staircases (two between the ground and second floor and a steep attic stair), panel doors, door hardware, high baseboards and ornate window and door casings. Whilst these reflect the highly decorative detailing that was popular in the Victoria era, they are beginning to include some simpler "geometric" forms that became increasingly popular in the Edwardian period. Of note in this regard are the "chunky" newel posts of the front staircase.

Character Defining Elements/Heritage Attributes:

Important to the preservation of the property are the following character-defining elements/heritage attributes:

- The original massing of the two and a half storey smooth brick house with a projecting front bay and central gable dormer above.
- Low hip roof with wide projecting eaves
- · Smooth red brick exterior cladding and brick water table
- Gable dormer with arched window and returned eaves
- Placement of windows and door openings
- Plain red brick voussoirs above window and door openings with rusticated limestone windowsills
- Single leaf four-panel wooden front entrance door with original "wavy" glass insert, decorative trims and rectangular transom
- Two single-flue red brick chimneys
- Historical home of Frank McNiven, who served as Councillor and Reeve, governor of the Halton County Jail, the area's Police Chief, and Town of Milton assessor.

Staff Recommendation

Staff recommends that the optimal conservation and protection measures for this heritage property is the designation of the property.

Description of Property

The Dennis Hunter House is a two-and-a-half-storey, smooth red brick house that is a good example of late Victorian architecture transitioning into an Edwardian architectural style. The bricks used for this house are from the local brickworks.

Statement of Cultural Heritage Value or Interest

Its cultural heritage value lies in its historical and architectural significance. Frank McNiven, who served as Councillor and Reeve, governor of the Halton County Jail, the area's Police Chief, and Town of Milton assessor, owned this house from 1920 to 1946..

Historical Value

Cultural Heritage Value or Interest Evaluation

Ontario Regulation 9/06 of the *Ontario Heritage Act* establishes the criteria for determining Cultural Heritage Value of Heritage Resources. A property must have the potential to meet at least two of the criteria to be considered to have heritage significance. These criteria fall into three categories: design or physical value, historical or associative value and contextual value. The following table considers and evaluates the subject property against these criteria.

Based on the above criteria, the subject property has significant cultural heritage value based on both design and contextual criteria. These attributes are sufficient to warrant Heritage Designation under the *Ontario Heritage Act*. However, designation may not be necessary at this time as the property is current listed on the Municipal Heritage Register, which offers it some protection from demolition.







Historical Attributes _ Mc Niven Family History

- In April 1920, Frank McNiven bought this property from Daniel Hunter for \$6,500. He lived here until he sold the place in 1957 to Thomas and Peggy Watson
- Frank McNiven & wife, Ruby (Tweedle) had 2 children, who attended SS No. 1 and then took the train from Guelph Junction to Milton High School.
- Frank McNiven was Town Assessor for Nelson Township
- While in Nassagaweya he served on Township Council and was Reeve in 1928
- 1936 Frank & Ruby moved to Milton & became Governor & Matron of the Halton County Jail
- 1943 Frank became Police Chief of Milton
- 1943-1962 Frank was Assessor for Town of Milton
- Frank was the Chair of the Town's first Planning Board
- His son, Alex McNiven married Laura Milson and built a second house on the lot. Alex served in the army in WWII and became a Captain. During this time Laura and their daughters, Marion & Anne, moved to Milton and rented their house. Alex Joined the OPP in 1976 and was named Senior Volunteer in Service by the Ontario Ministry of Community and Social Services.
- In 1957 Alex McNiven sold farm (apart from smaller house) to Thomas & Peggy Watson who lived here with their 2 children until they moved to Campbellville in 1965.
- Both Frank & Alex are included in the Milton Historical Society's "Milton Area

OBITUARY

The Canadian Champion, Wedne

Frank McNiver

Frank McNiven, a well known and highly respected citizen of the community for the past 30 years and a resident of the district most of his life, died at Milton District Hospital late Tuesday evening, May 10, in his 78th year.

He has been ill for nearly four years and was hospitalized two months ago. Born and raised on a farm, Mr. McNiven farmed until 1936, when he moved to Milton and took up municipal work. He was active in many organizations and Lodge work.

Funeral service was held Saturday from the MacNab & Son Chapel, Milton, with interment at Evergreen cemetery. Rev. J. L. Graham of St. Paul's United Church conducted the service. A Masonic service was held in the chapel the previous evening.

Honorary pallbearers were friends T. H. Sayder of Fergus. Dr. H. R. McDonald of Kilbride and Frank Thompson, Charles N. Kerr, William Randell, T. A. Hutchinson, Dewar Thompson and Wilfred Gazely, all of Milton.

Pallbearers were friends and Lodge associates, Frank Chisholm, Edgar Foster, Henry Gorter, Archie Cairns, Fred Auckland and Jack Charlton, all of Milton and district.

Born in Wentworth County on January 20, 1899, Mr. McNiven was one of nine children of the late J. A. McNiven and Minerva Mount. He married Ruby Marion Tweedle at the Tweedle Farm now Cedar Springs Community Club resort on Cedar Springs Rd., Nelson, in 1908, and they celebrated their 57th anniversary last June.

Following their marriage they lived in Hamilton five years, then returned to Nelson for another six years, when he served as township assessor. They moved to a Nassagaweya farm for the next 16 years, and during this time he served several years on the township council and was Reeve in 1928. Last fall

when the township opened its new municipal administration building, Mr. McNiven was among several former reeves in attendance.

In 1936 they moved to Milton, where he and his wife assumed the positions of Governor and Matron of Halton County Joil. After seven years at the jail, he hecame police chief of Milton, a task that in the 1940's entailed nine other titles including weed inspector, dog catcher, assessor, truancy officer and building inspector. Following five years at this work, he became town assessor and building inspector, a post he held until he retired tour years ago.

Mr. McNiven was chairman of the town's first Planning Board, a past president of the Hallon Liberal Association, a life member of Milton Lawn Bowling Club and a life member of Milton District Hospital Corporation.

He joined the Masonic Lodge

48 years ago in Burlington and when he invoved to Nassagawe ya, helped form the Campbell Lodge and assisted in erecting the Lodge Hall in Campbell-ville. When he moved to Milton, he also joined St. Clair Masonic Lodge, A. F. and A. M. He was a Past Master of Campbell Lodge, honorary member of the Past Masters' Association of Hamilton district, and Past District Deputy Grand Master of District Deputy Grand Master of District A, Hamilton, He was a member of Halton Chapter No.

280, Order of the Eastern Star. Active in St. Paul's United Church, he served as an elder and as superintendent of the Sunday School for several

He was also an avid sports fan and enjoyed baseball, hockey and football. Once he was president of the Halton - Wentworth Counties Baseball League and right up until the time of his death kept an interest in sports through television.

He was educated at Kilbride public school, and travelled by stagecoach to attend Water down high school.

Surviving are his wife Ruby of 98 Lydia St., Milton, and two children, a son James Alexander McNiven, who is Traffic Sergeant with No. 1 District Headquarters, O.P.P. at Chat ham; and a daughter, Mrs. C V. Mills (Marion) of Willow dale.


